Clover (Big pro-bees ע love it and spreads quickly)

The Bad-I am guessing no one has seeds sprouting. Well don't worry it's not something you did...it seems we missed a step. So let's take this as an opportunity to learn something. Did you know that many seeds need to go though a process called Stratification in order to germinate and sprout? The Hopeful-it's not possible for us to locate our tiny seeds and start over. So here is what I am trying and perhaps it will work, fingers crossed. I have placed my pots outside and I am waiting for two good cold snaps. Then I will bring them in and hope they sprout. The even better news is Liz Platé has taken some seeds and will stratify and sow them this winter. Surely between our bare root specimens and Liz's efforts we will have something to show at the spring plant exchange. (PS: I still have Arrowood seeds, hint hint.)
